# Guidelines for Adjunct Honors Seminars (Course Numbers 89 and 189)

The one-unit honors seminars are designed to provide students who are enrolled in a lecture course with an opportunity to convene separately with a faculty member in a small-group setting. Seminars should explore content beyond that provided in the lecture course and discussion section.

Course numbers **89** and **189** have been set up in each department and reserved for honors seminars and advanced honors seminars. The seminars are one-unit adjuncts to primary lecture courses at lower and upper division levels.

### **Details of 89 and 189 Adjunct Honors Seminar Courses**

- 1. Seminars numbered 89 are adjuncts to lowerdivision courses while seminars numbered 189 are adjuncts to upper-division courses.
- 2. Seminars must be offered by the instructor of record for the primary lecture course.
- Seminars are taken concurrently with a lecture course.
- 5. Seminars do not replace the discussion section associated with the primary lecture course; they must be in addition to all the requirements set forth by the departments for the primary lecture course.
- 5. In-class instruction must be for a minimum of ten hours per quarter, meeting on either a weekly or biweekly basis.
- 6. The grading basis for the seminars is P/NP or letter grade; however, College Honors students refer to "Receiving Honors Credit."
- 7. Enrollment in the honors seminars is open to all students unless the professor restricts the course only to College Honors students.

#### **Enrollment Restrictions**

- 1. Limited to a maximum of 20 students with a minimum enrollment of 8 students.
- 2. Seminars are not permitted in basic skills courses such as elementary language classes, basic writing and composition classes, basic math classes, etc.
- 3. Honors Seminars cannot be set-up for courses already small in nature and designated as "SEM" (seminar) or "STU" (studio).

# **How Students Enroll**

- 1. Student(s) would approach a professor to discuss setting up the honors seminar. If the professor agrees, he/she will have their department set-up the course number (as well as PTE#s) to be given to the students who will be participating.
- 2. Enrollment is by consent of instructor using PTEs through Friday of third week of classes (the College add deadline).
- 3. Add/drop policies and changing grading basis deadlines are the same as for any non-impacted course.

#### **Receiving Honors Credit**

- 1. The 89 and 189 seminars automatically carry an honors notation on the transcript.
- 2. College Honors program students must receive a grade of B or better in both the lecture and the adjunct seminar to be eligible for College Honors Program credit.
- 3. Students should check with their department to see whether the seminar can be applied toward departmental honors.

# **Transcript Notation**

Here is a standard format for the short title that appears on the transcript: HNRS-MAIN COURSE NUMBER.

Example: PSYCH 120A COGNITIVE PSYCH
PSYCH 189 HNRS-PSYCH 120A
HONORS CONTENT
